LENNOX NEWS

Some interesting facts you might not know about the art world:

- Claude Monet was a popular caricaturist working under the name 'Oscar Monet' before becoming the renowned impressionist painter we know him as today. His original caricatures sold for just 10-20 francs each. In 2019 one of his early sketches was sold in New York for \$37.575.
- William Hogarth had a pug called <u>Trump</u>, who famously features in several of his paintings. Louis-François Roubiliac created a sculpture of Trump in terracotta to accompany a bust of Hogarth in 1741.
- 3. Rembrandt van Rijn signed his paintings in many different ways. His early work is often initiated with a Latin monogram: RHL (Rembrandus Hermanni Leydensis). He also used RHL-van-Rijn before settling on a simple signature of just 'Rembrandt.' Although his artwork is now some of the most famous and highly priced in the art world, he died in poverty in 1669.
- 4. Some art historians believe that Dutch master Johannes Vermeer used a camera obscura to create his paintings. This was an invention which could project a scene onto a wall in a dimly lit room. This theory came about as scans show that Vermeer didn't use initial outlines for his paintings and yet was able to achieve a near-perfect perspective.
- 5. Vincent Van Gogh fell in love with his cousin Kee Vos Stricker. On one occasion he asked to marry her, putting his hand over a candle to show his love for her and saying he would not remove it until they could marry, however, Kee's father blew out the candle and banned Van Gogh from their house.
- 6. When it comes to **religious art**, symbols are very important. You can often spot which saint is which by knowing what to look for. The apostles Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John all have specific figures which will help you to know who you're looking at. Matthew has a winged angel, Mark a winged Lion, Luke a winged bull and John an eagle.

- 7. Olympic events are now associated with sporting achievements, but the founder of the modern games began with the aim of artistic talent as being just as great as that of athletes. Between 1912 and 1948 numerous medals were awarded for sport inspired architecture, sculpture, musical talent, paintings, and works of literature. The Olympic art events ended in 1954 because artists were considered to be too professional, while the athletes were required to be amateurs. Since 1956, the Olympic cultural programme has taken their place instead.
- 8. Vermeer's masterpiece Girl with a Pearl Earring is not a portrait. She is a character known in art as a 'Tronie' a figure typically found in Flemish Baroque art that is used to convey an emotion or allegory. Tronies are typically found in generic paintings of elderly people to examine themes of old age, or figures laughing and pulling dramatic expressions.
- **9.** The Pietà is the only piece of work that Michelangelo ever signed. He later saw this as an embarrassing display of his own pride and never signed an artwork again.

Featured artist(s) for October 2025:

1. Alyssa Joy Black

Alyssa is an artist based in Alstonville, NSW. She holds a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) from Curtin University, majoring in both Fine Art and Visual Culture, and now is working primarily in oil paintings.

Throughout her studies and early solo and group exhibitions, Alyssa's work explored the lived experience of severe mental illness, a challenge she has faced since childhood. Her paintings from this period gave visual form to the complex emotional and psychological dimensions of that journey.

Following a recent significant episode, Alyssa's practice has shifted to embrace a more restorative approach. Turning to the natural beauty of her garden, she began creating her *Awakening* series — paintings that celebrate colour, light, and the simple yet profound delight found in nature. These works embody a dialogue between inner struggle and external beauty, offering viewers a glimpse of joy and brightness even amidst darkness.

Through her art, Alyssa seeks to share this sense of solace and visual wonder, inviting audiences to experience the healing and transformative power of nature.

An ode to Olley

eries inspired by Margaret Olley and her legacy opened at the Tweed Regional Gallery last week.

Ode: Margaret Olley and Sally Anderson brings together still life objects borrowed from Olley's paintings by Olley spanning four home studio re-creation alongside decades, including masterworks personally significant items within such as Banksia 1970 (Maitland Regional Art Gallery), works from the Art Gallery of NSW and rarely seen pieces from private collections.

Sydney-based artist Sally Anderson created a new body of work as part of her 2025 residency

Anderson said her approach was to juxtapose Olley's objects with her own and invites audiences to reconsider Olley's still life practice in a new light.
"I've deliberately positioned

personally significant items within my compositions to give them new context and meaning," Anderson

"I find the arrangement of Olley's home studio re-creation completely fascinating - the layers of objects, surfaces, textiles, smells.

memories, households, feelings, gardens, furniture, objects, colo and how rearranging the order of things ultimately shifts meaning, revealing new truths, narratives, and histories.

Gallery Director Ingrid Hedgeock said the exhibition highlights Olley's continuing influence on contemporary artists.

"Seeing these works alongside Anderson's bold interchanges between abstraction and representation, we bear witness to Olley's continuing influence as one of Australia's most significant painters of still life and interiors," Hedgcock said.

"A lot of people look at the recreation and see chaos, but to Olley it was a carefully gathered world of

subject matter for her paintings."

The exhibition will run until March 8, 2026. Sally Anderson in Conversation with Professor Lisa Slade will take place on Friday, September 19, at 6 pm.

Girl With Balloon

<u>Girl with Balloon</u> is undoubtedly one of Banksy's most recognizable works. The image of a little girl reaching towards a red heart-shaped balloon was created as part of a London series of street art works starting in 2002. As well as being one of Banksy's most famous pieces, it's also one of his most optimistic, as the original mural was accompanied by the words "There is always hope".

None of the paintings from the series remain on the streets but sets of limited edition Girl with Balloon prints were released during the 2000s, and are now incredibly valuable. In fact, a print of the girl reaching for a purple balloon sold for over \$1 million in September 2020 — the most expensive print sold in an online auction.
