# PRESIDENTS REPORT

During last year I was fortunate to take a little holiday in Brisbane (Meeanjin, the place of the blue water lilies) and I spent some time at the <u>Gallery Of Modern Art</u>.

There was an exceptional exhibition called <u>SIS Pacific Art 1980 – 2023</u>. This series began in 1993 and has been celebrated for its engagement with Aotearoa New Zealand and the wider Pacific.

This exhibition is staged in two rotations in the upper galleries. It has been acquired through bequests and is still able to be viewed until September 2024.

The whole exhibition is a powerful reminder of the importance of women artists and the deep sense of attachment and responsibility that each woman has to her land, community, and culture.

Employing an array of approaches across photography, video installation, ceramics, shells, embroidery, recycled copper sculptures, and weaving, SIS shares artworks and practices that negotiate the impact of Western values, ideas and encounters on the peoples and cultures of the Pacific.

It is an exhibition that touched my soul. I just loved it and went to view it twice. Hopefully, you will find the time to visit this exhibition during the year before it ends. I look forward to meeting you all for the AGM on Tuesday, 2 April.

We will also be talking about the coming exhibition in the first weekend of May and how we can contribute to its success.

# **LENNOX NEWS**

I'm continuing on with ways to try and save costs in tight times. Sometimes you have paintings you are not happy with and wish to recycle the canvas:

- Most of us know that repainting the canvas with Gesso will allow us to use the canvas again and again.
- If you have a lot of texture sanding between coats of gesso (I recommend 3), this can bring the canvas back to life.
- Be very careful of using cheap gesso I have found that sometimes the gesso will lift the paint and it will peel off. This can be heartbreaking when you have achieved something with which you are happy.
- I always suggest that you wash a new canvas (particularly a cheap one) with soapy water, then coat with gesso before it is used.
- Adding a bit of colour to the gesso can work as a background too.

Those little wooden things hanging off the back of the canvases have a use too!

Occasionally you may find that the surface has slackened slightly, before or after you have started painting. In most cases, your canvas will come with a bag of wooden canvas wedges (<u>also known as canvas keys)</u>, which can be used to tighten up the tension of your canvas, if you find it has loosened, it can also help straighten the canvas.



You can make your own gesso (recipe below), it does work, but my preference is to buy a reasonable sized can of white acrylic undercoat paint – often used in art schools when preparing raw canvases.

#### **HOME MADE GESSO RECIPE**

For this project you'll need:

- 3 parts CORNFLOUR
- 3 parts- Baking Soda
- 1 part acrylic glue
- 1 part- White acrylic paint
- 2-3 parts water

#### Method:

- 1. Mix the cornflour and baking soda together, breaking up any lumps in the mixture.
- 2. Then, mix in your PVA glue and acrylic paint.
- 3. Finally, add water, a little bit at a time, until you have the right consistency.
- 4. For a thicker "texture paste", add *less* water.
- 5. For a more "traditional" gesso texture, add water until the mixture looks like pancake batter.

The only downside to making gesso is that it has a shorter shelf life than store bought gesso. This will last about a week or two when stored in an airtight container.

Next month, I'll be talking about how to reduce costs when working with watercolours.
