LENNOX NEWS

Continuing with the Copyright information from last month. This is the second of 3 articles. Most of this article is copied from the <u>Australian Copyright</u> <u>Council</u>, you can download your own fact sheets or contact them directly if you have a question.

Below are some frequently asked questions ...

How can I prove I am the copyright owner?

Keeping copies of sketches or photographs of your work is usually sufficient to prove copyright.

Can I prevent another artist using the same styles or techniques?

Copyright law does not protect styles or techniques. However, if another artist's use of your distinctive style means that people confuse that artist with you, you may be able to take legal action under the law of passing off or consumer protection legislation. You will generally need to get advice from a lawyer with expertise in these areas of law.

If I advertise a limited edition of a print, can I make more copies later?

Generally, no. A person who had purchased a limited-edition work from you might be able to take legal action against you if you were to make more copies later (e.g. for breach of contract, fraud, or breach of consumer protection laws).

Can works entered in a competition be reproduced without the artist's permission?

This depends on the rules of the competition, and whether the artist has agreed to those rules by entering the competition. If you are considering entering a competition, you should look carefully at the rules, and perhaps get advice.

What if someone copies my work?

It will be an infringement of your copyright if someone uses a substantial part of your work without your permission and if an exception does not apply. If you think your copyright has been infringed, there are a number of steps you can take, including requesting that a fee be paid for the use. For more information on this subject, see our fact sheet <u>creating artworks on commission</u>.

If I am paid to create a design, what rights does the client have?

As noted above, a freelance artist or designer is usually the first owner of copyright. Generally, the client will have the right to use the design for the purpose for which it was commissioned. It is a good idea to have a written agreement, which sets out the client's rights.

Can I use another person's work without permission if I make changes?

You do not escape the obligation to get permission by making changes or additions to a work (such as changing the colours). If you can put two works side by side and identify important parts that have been copied, it is likely that you need permission.

Do I need permission to make a collage?

You do not need permission if you do not copy (e.g. if you are making a collage from photographs cut from magazines). You may need permission if you subsequently wish to reproduce a collage (e.g. in a catalogue). Generally, you will need permission from any copyright owner whose work is substantially reproduced by reproducing the collage (even if it is a small part of the collage).

You should also ensure that any uses you make of the work do not result in the work being treated in a way that is prejudicial to the honour or reputation of the artist, or you may be liable for infringing their moral right of integrity.

Do I need permission to make a painting or drawing based on a photograph?

Generally, if you use a photograph as a source of information (e.g. for information about the colours or proportions of an animal), you will not need permission. However, if you reproduce an important part of the photographer's composition, you may need permission.



Do I need permission to photograph or draw public art?

You may draw, paint, photograph, or film a sculpture or work of artistic craftsmanship, which is publicly, displayed other than temporarily without permission from the copyright owner. This does not apply to other public art, such as murals. You may draw, paint, photograph, or film a building without permission.


Do I need permission to scan and alter an image to create a new work?

Scanning a copyright protected image to produce a digitised version reproduces the image, and thus requires permission. You will also generally need permission to produce a new image by altering the digitised image if an important part of the first image is recognisable in the new image.

You should also ensure that any changes you make do not result in the work being treated in a way that is prejudicial to the honour or reputation of the artist, or you may be liable for infringing their moral right of integrity.

Copyright infringement is being coming more and more complex, particularly with social media. Next month we will talk more, about how you can avoid infringement and the large number of sites that are available to artists.

Another example of copyright infringement: This work was copied to make greeting cards and the artist spotted it. Very annoying as its happened to me!!

Article of interest about National Gallery of Australia (NGA), Canberra – 'Know My Name. Making it Modern' exhibition review by Geoffrey Maclean on Thursday, 17 August 2023

Know My Name: Making it Modern celebrates pioneering women artists who changed the course of modern art in Australia.



Drawn from the national collection, this major exhibition profiles Ethel Spowers, Eveline Syme, Margaret Preston, Grace Cossington Smith, Clarice Beckett and Olive Cotton, their works unified by their expressions of daily life, nature, still life and interior worlds of place, mind, and imagination.

'Know my name', an <u>NGA</u> initiative, celebrates the work of all women artists with an aim to enhance the understanding of their contribution to Australia's cultural life.

WOW! A Tour de Force of my favourite artists from favourite historical period in Australian Art. This is a large major exhibition, one gallery rolling on after the next, full of the most wonderful art works. Let me share some, the work speaks for itself ...

GRACE COSSINGTON SMITH

Above we see her original sketch book with notes of her painting near her home in Turramurra. Her attention to detail in composition preparation, noting every colour, is very technical. She was informed at the time by the theosophical writings of Beatrice Irwin who believed that spiritual colours should be imbued with a phosphorescent quality.

I saw the Pierre Bonnard exhibition at the Tate Modern in 2019 and looking at these two paintings by Cossington Smith there is a very common similarity in subject matter, choice of colours and brush stroke technique. Dare I say one artist could be mistaken for the other.

Spowers often used her Melbourne studio as a practical and social space, regularly inviting her friends for an afternoon life drawing class.

DORRIT BLACK

In 1928 Black joined Australian artists Grace Crowley and Anne Dangar at the <u>Académie Lhote</u> in Paris to study under influential cubist painter Andre Lhote and while in Paris another cubist artist Albert Gleizes. This radical training in modernist principals heavily influenced Black's distinctive style.

This exceptional NGA exhibition runs from Saturday, 5 August to Sunday, 8 October 2023.
