LENNOX NEWS

It's a very busy month. I am working to get the Town and Gown art exhibition on its way. The exhibition is an annual fund raiser for the Lennox Head Public School, a joint project by Lennox Head Lions and The Art Team. The Art Team consists of my students, who I mentor and teach. Some of whom have been with me for 20 years. The Town and Gown has been running for over 10 years. The exhibition has given the school over \$60,000, not a trifling amount. We will be having a musician, lucky door, raffles and fabulous food and wine on the opening night. Entry will be \$10.00, exhibitors are exempted from paying. We will also be awarding a "Special Interest Prize" of \$400.00 for a special painting which will be selected by an independent judge.

I am often asked what "Town and Gown" means in reference to our Art Exhibition:

"Town and gown" refer to the co-operative relationship between the local educational institutions and the towns people the surrounding town or city where it's located. The "town" represents the non-academic residents, while the "gown" signifies the scholastic community, including students and teachers. Although the term usually refers to a university environment it has been adapted as a quirky reference to the relationship between the local community – Lennox Head Lions and the Lennox Public School.

The exhibition is on from Friday 19, Saturday 20 through to Sunday 21 September. If you would like to enter everyone is welcome, entry forms are available on the BACCI Facebook page.



A very absorbing professional job took most of my time, so I only started painting 15 years ago after retiring.


Harry Westera put a flier in my letter box which encouraged me to start his classes in Clunes.


I mostly paint in watercolour and some in acrylic, I can paint in oils.

CREATIVE ARTISANS GALLERY NEWS

Featured artist(s) for September 2025:

1. Jenni Rogers

Based in the picturesque town of Alstonville, NSW, Jenni Rogers is a multidisciplinary artist, surface pattern designer, animator, chef, and maker. With a rich and diverse background that seamlessly weaves together food, art, and storytelling, Jenni's work captures the nostalgia and joy of shared meals and lovingly prepared treats.

Jenni's creative journey began early — she purchased her first café at the age of just 16, a testament to her entrepreneurial spirit and passion for food and hospitality. It was later in life, however, that she discovered a deep love for painting, particularly inspired by the textures, colours, and emotions found in the kitchen. From fluffy cakes and rustic sourdough to delicate pastries and sunlit table scenes, her paintings celebrate the beauty of food and the stories it carries.

For Jenni, food is inherently emotional — an anchor to memory, family, and connection.

"Our favourite recipes remind us of our loved ones," she explains. "When we create them, in a way, it brings them back to us."

Her artworks often begin from life or her own photographs, and are infused with warmth, sincerity, and sensory richness. Each brushstroke evokes the textures and feelings of the subject — be it the golden crumb of a fresh-baked cake or the light glinting off a jar of jam.

This month's exhibition showcases a joyful crosssection of Jenni's creative world, featuring her:

- signature Recipe-Art Tea Towels
- hand-sewn and hand-painted children's aprons and oven mitts; and
- original food-inspired paintings and fine art prints

Every piece is a tribute to Jenni's love of food, family, and handmade beauty. Whether painting en plein air, designing surface patterns for textiles and homewares, or animating whimsical kitchen characters, Jenni brings a distinct sense of heart, humour, and authenticity to all she creates. Her work invites us to celebrate the everyday magic of cooking, creativity, and connection.

Visit to Tweed Regional Gallery Thursday, 18 September 2025

What's on ... there are several new exhibitions that we can view:

- The Olive Cotton Award for photographic portraiture showcases new portraits by professional and emerging artists. The Award recognises excellence in photographic portraiture and is generously funded by the family of Olive Cotton.
- Ode: Margaret Olley and Sally Anderson is a celebration of important still life paintings by Margaret Olley (1923–2011) together with new work by Gadigal/Sydney-based artist Sally Anderson.
- Water Connects Us All by Arakwal Bundjalung artist Nickolla Clark celebrates the traditional practices of Bundjalung people, and their rich cultural heritage associated with water. Clark was the recipient of the 2024 Bundjalung Award, Wollumbin Art Award, and her resulting solo exhibition shares important messages taught by her ancestors — the matriarchs who strongly advocated for the health of Country.
- Regional artist Dean Stewart deconstructs and rearranges found objects to evoke emotion and memory in his latest solo exhibition, Material Memory. The works explore how materials hold meaning through the stories we attach to them, and the traces of the past they ultimately carry. Viewers are invited to reflect on what feels familiar, what spark joy or nostalgia, and to experience something unexpected in the ordinary. Material Memory is a celebration of memory made visible, in forms both playful and profound.
- Sharing the National Collection Monet, Olley and Morandi Until 26 October 2025 Tweed Regional Gallery has been honoured to be the custodian of Claude Monet's Meules, milieu du jour [Haystacks, midday] 1890 since November 2023 as part of the Sharing the National Collection initiative.
